## A Letter From Pastor Erlandson

Dear Friends:

"Christ is risen!" **He is risen indeed! Alleluia!**

It was just last week that we celebrated the Resurrection of Our Lord with an awesome festival Eucharist. The music from the choirs, orchestra, and organ singing praises for God's mighty act in raising Jesus from the dead still echoes in our memories. *Jesus Christ is risen today, Alleluia!* Now the sanctuary lies silent, the fragrant smell of incense still hangs in the air, but all is quiet. So strange, after the activities of the previous week's celebration.

What happened last week? Once again, we re-enacted the drama of Holy Week, starting with Palm Sunday, when we processed from outside into the church sanctuary like Jesus entered Jerusalem to the peoples' *Hosannas!* We heard the story of Jesus' Passion in the dramatic reading from Luke's gospel, led by our own assembled group of readers. On Thursday, we gathered to remember Jesus' Last Supper with his disciples, received the laying on of hands in forgiveness of sins, washing one another's feet in obedience to Jesus' greatest commandment "to love one another as I have loved you." Then, following Eucharist, we stripped the altar bare of all vessels, symbols and furnishings to enter the Sacred Three Days.

On Good Friday evening we heard the Passion of our Lord from the reading of John's gospel, and then a moving song of Mary, the mother of our Lord's grief, in the *Stabat Mater* (set to music by Antonio Caldara), sung by soloists, choir, and orchestra. We then carried the cross into the sanctuary for the Adoration of the Cross, and left in silence to ponder what we had done to our Lord. On Holy Saturday we gathered again for the Great Vigil of Easter, with friends from St. Paul-Reformation Lutheran Church and Christ Lutheran on Capitol Hill, with our combined choirs and cantors leading our musical responses.

We came together in worship one last time on Sunday morning for the Feast of Easter, with choirs, handbells and Easter orchestra in a great celebration of song, Word and Sacrament. The word? *Christ is risen! He is risen, indeed! Alleluia!*

We owe many thanks to all our musicians, soloists, choirs, our organist Katie Thompson, and our music director Jon Strommen Campbell for their leadership throughout the week, and to all who helped lead worship, decorate, and prepare the feast.

So now, what do we do? We have a week of "quiet" to rest and recover. We come back to gather again in worship without so great a sound – but the message is the same: *Christ is risen!* For every Sunday is Easter again! Thomas the disciple comes to seek the Lord whom he did not see the first time, and professes his faith. Like Thomas, we come the week after Easter, centuries later, seeking to meet our Lord so that we, too, can follow in faith. With so much discord and strife, with poverty and racism in our communities, terrorism and war in our world, we, too, are looking for hope. So much distrust, anger and hopelessness around us, we come seeking faith and peace.

We find our peace in the Lord, who came to his disciples saying "*Peace be with you.*" We greet each other with these same words before Eucharist every Sunday. Jesus invites us to bring these words of peace out into the world, to bring the peace of the Lord to our neighbors. This is how we can respond to Jesus' commandment to love: by sharing peace with others and serving our neighbors with love. How will they know that Jesus is present in our world? When we share Christ's peace, and serve with love as Christ serves us. In Jesus' name.

*Christ is risen! He is our peace!*

### CONFIRMATION

Confirmation class will meet on **Wednesday, April 13 at 7:00 pm**, after a short 2-week break following Lent and Holy Week. We are preparing for the Affirmation of Baptism (Confirmation) worship service on Sunday, May 15, the Feast of Pentecost. So we will take a look at the three ecumenical creeds (statements of faith) of the Church – the Apostles', Nicene, and Athanasian Creeds. How did they come to be, how are they different, and what is similar?

Then we will talk together about what it is that God is calling us to in affirming our baptisms. What is Jesus asking when he invites us to "follow me?" What does it mean to affirm our baptisms, and what are we promising (to God, who has promised to always love us, and to give us life forever)? We promise to *live among God's faithful people, to hear the word of God and share in the Lord's supper, to proclaim the good news of God in Christ through word and deed, to serve all people, following the example of Jesus, and to strive for justice and peace in all the earth.* We discussed these promises during our Lenten evening prayer services, and we will repeat them as a whole Church on Pentecost Sunday, when we all affirm our baptisms.

Once again, Lutheran Church of the Redeemer, 285 Dale St N, will be hosting guests from Project Home - providing safe, clean, and comfortable overnight shelter for local families facing homelessness. Project Home partners with The Family Place in downtown Saint Paul, which provides many daytime services including life skills classes, meals, showers, and laundry facilities.

Even as the economy improves, many Minnesotans have been left behind - especially in Ramsey County, according to the most recent Wilder Research study. Many of the families we host have one or more parents working, but low wages and high rents keep stable housing just out of reach for too many people. Project Home lends a helping hand as these families work toward a better life and you can help.
