Our Church Vestry meeting was opened by Sybil on October 12, 2021 on Zoom with prayer. Advent and Christmas worship is being planned with the Elders and Music Team. The Vestry appreciates with gratitude that the LCR worshipping community complies with covid prevention measures, including vaccination, masks and distancing, especially during coffee hour with only four persons per table.

There will be no Thanksgiving eve service this year. Midweek Advent services before choir practice are being planned. There will be a Lesson and Carols on the 4th Sunday (Dec 19). Details on Christmas services will be announced soon.

The Treasury has an overall balance of \$128500 with mortgage due of \$72119 plus interest. In September, building and grounds expenses for asphaltting and tax assessments were double the income. The Langer \$49500 roofing bill will be paid by withdrawal from our Vanguard fund, payment from restricted funds, and a \$12000 one-year installment payment plan by Langer. Efficiency upgrade for lighting started on Monday, Oct 19 and the Congregation was asked to approve expense for efficiency upgrade for heating at the Oct 17 Congregation meeting.

The proposal of the Women's Guild to continue as a core group to maintain a roster for hospitality ministry for our congregation and to cease monthly meetings.

Organizations seeking to rent the office space attached to the undercroft are being sought and interviewed.

Sybil adjourned the meeting at 8:44p.

The next Vestry meeting will be held on November 9 on Zoom.

NOVEMBER IS STEWARDSHIP MONTH

This week every Redeemer household should have received your annual Stewardship Letter invitation to make your Financial Commitment (pledge) to God and the Church for 2022. Please prayerfully consider your commitment to our mission together at Redeemer, not only to worship and maintain the facility, but also to reach out to others in the community with the good news of Jesus Christ. We hope to receive all pledges in November.

In the stewardship letter, we said we would include a summary of the expenditures for Building Restoration (repairs and needed upgrades) that have already been approved by the congregation or discussed by the Vestry. Some have been completed this fall, some are in the process of being done, and some are planned for coming months. So we are hoping that you can make an additional gift to the church for Building Restoration this year (2021) or in 2022 to help us maintain the facility.

Building Restoration Summary

The **LED Lighting upgrade** project approved was \$22,303.90 – after rebates our total is **\$16,972.80**. We received a 4-year interest free loan to assist in paying for this.

The new heating (**boiler upgrades**) cost was \$11,000 total – but after rebates is **\$7500**. We have not sought financing – bank loan would be around 4% interest. Would rather pay with donations, if possible.

The **roof repairs project** was completed in September. The total cost was **\$49,500**. We are paying \$37,500 up front. The balance of \$12,000 is payable as we are able, at no interest. We are asking for individuals to assist with gifts to roof repair (and several of you have given significant gifts).

New ceiling tiles in the Undercroft and elevator lounge will cost **\$5100** – which includes dumpster and scaffolding, provided by Langer Construction. We will do the labor ourselves (if you'd like to help, contact Tammy Cownie). We are able to pay this in installments as we are able, again, with no interest charged..

Asphalt repair in the parking lot cost **\$6500**, and was done in September, also. This repaired some holes in the asphalt, which we paved in 1995. We paid this with cash on hand (an unanticipated, unbudgeted repair).

There have also been some assessments by the city for work on Carroll and Iglehart streets done last summer (not included in this total, but which we have paid).

The grand total for building repairs/upgrades in 2021 is \$85,373.

We have made a transfer of funds from Vanguard (our "rainy day" fund) to help pay for the roof repair project. With additional gifts we can avoid taking more out of Vanguard as we pay for these building restoration projects. Thank you for any gifts you can give!

The Art I Loved at 15 : A Reflection by Diana M Rankin

"When you're 15, or thereabouts, you love the art you love more passionately than you'll ever love art again." This is the first line in a *New York Times* article from December 4, 2018. The author, Jonah Weiner, was reminiscing about his favorite band at age 15, a rap-rock group called Rage Against the Machine. Don't ask me why I was attracted to the article, but somehow Facebook knew it would interest me.

I know exactly what art I was most passionate about when I was 15. It all really began in 1958 when a 23-year-old American named Van Cliburn won the inaugural International Tchaikovsky Competition with a performance of Tchaikovsky's Piano Concerto No. 1. I was fortunate to have a music teacher who exposed us to classical music. She made a big deal of this Cold War event and played Van Cliburn's recording for us. In 1960, my parents purchased a "hi-fi" and several LPs. One, of course, was Van Cliburn's Grammy-winning recording of the concerto. The other was of Handel's *Messiah*, probably the 1958 Mormon Tabernacle Choir recording with Eugene Ormandy and the Philadelphia Orchestra. I still love this art passionately, but have eagerly expanded my palate beyond Tchaikovsky and Handel.

There is a field of psychology devoted to the study of music preference or musical taste. Supposedly it is possible, at least in American culture, to predict someone's personality traits by the music they prefer. For example, someone who is open to experience prefers complex music such as classical and jazz as well as eclectic genres. Persons who are agreeable are said to prefer upbeat and conventional music.

When looking for a church, either as a member or as a paid musician, I have always gravitated toward those that placed a high value on classical music. This was true of the Unitarian church in Springfield, Massachusetts where I was organist, as well as Episcopalian, Roman Catholic, Methodist, and Lutheran congregations I served or belonged to.

Redeemer's musical experience has extended way beyond what most of us grew up with. Our palates, however, have accepted unfamiliar musical expressions of faith. Dixieland band? Why not. Jazz ensemble? Sure. Black gospel? Of course. White gospel? Yep. African, Native American, Hispanic, and Asian music? Definitely. Praise bands? Not yet.

Van Cliburn and the Mormon Tabernacle Choir are now out of fashion, but classical music is still my passion. When I worship, however, I want to experience the musical expressions of other Christians, especially those who are not white like me. I want to sing their songs so I can better weep with those who weep, dance with those who dance, and shout with those who shout. I want to be ready for the cacophony of alleluias that I know await all God's saints.

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
