A Letter From Pastor Erlandson

Dear friends,

As we close out the calendar on 2016 and begin a new year, we reflect on the past year and look forward to beginning another. Our reflection may be a mixture of sadness, regret, satisfaction and accomplishment. In many ways we have probably fallen short of our own expectations, but have also experienced joy and moments of renewed hope. For those times of falling short, we ask for forgiveness, and discover again the power of God's forgiveness. We resolve to "do better", and ask for God's guidance.

We enter the year 2017 with hope and expectations, but also with some fear for what the future will bring. The national political climate has made some fearful of the changes that may be coming, if campaign promises are kept. What will happen to undocumented immigrants, or persons of other faiths – if words spoken out of ignorance or anger turn into legislation or action? Will "we the people" be able to continue to hold things together for the common good, when there is so much divisiveness, hostility and suspicion?

This is a challenging time for the world, our nation, and the Church. While we are committed to remain nonpartisan in politics, we are also bound by faith to "love the Lord your God with all your heart, soul, mind and strength, and your neighbor as yourself." We are bound to the values of our faith, which include following Jesus in compassion for those who suffer, to break down the barriers that would divide us, to care for widows, orphans, and all who are vulnerable. Indeed it is a "good time to be the Church", as our faith is challenged today in ways that we might not have imagined in previous years.

For who would have imagined that we in the Church would ever have to "go public" in the community with our commitment to "stand with undocumented immigrants" and offer sanctuary in our churches to those who are faced with deportation? We hope and pray that it does not come to this, but part of our witness to the world is to declare our willingness to make sacrifices and give sanctuary out of love for God and neighbor. The first line of defense against mistreatment and injustice of others is our voice and our example of faith.

In the past Lutheran Church of the Redeemer has been a place where immigrants from many nations have come to worship in a new land. More recently we have offered our church undercroft as a place for families experiencing homelessness to sleep in safety and warmth, until they could find a home of their own. We have shared this ministry with many other congregations through Project Homet. The new sanctuary movement is just another step in our journey of faith, in which we hope no family faces deportation or fear, for the "crime" of being "undocumented". We will speak out boldly for the need of a path to citizenship, and the repair of our broken immigration system. The last resort would be for our churches to be sanctuaries for families at risk, but only if our words and our efforts fall short of what we hope to accomplish: a community and nation where all families can live in safety, without fear.

"Come, you that are blessed by my Father, inherit the kingdom prepared for you...For I was hungry and you gave me food, thirsty and you gave me drink, a stranger and you welcomed me, naked and you gave me clothing, sick and you took care of me, in prison and you visited me." (Matthew 25:34-36)

Indeed it is a good time to be the Church. And it is critical that we act as the Church, with faith, hope and love, as a witness to the world. May God give us strength and faith to be true disciples of Jesus Christ.

Back on December 6th, Redeemer hosted a press conference organized by ISAIAH to announce congregations that are committing to be potential sanctuary sites, and support to those sites, if refugees or immigrants in our community are threatened with deportation. On Thursdays in December, we also began hosting teaching sessions about the immigration system and how it came to be the mess that it is. These teaching sessions will continue on Thursdays in January.


Interested in what you may have been missing? Curious what all this is about? The **Core Team** will be holding **two forums** in January during coffee hour, after the services, on **January 8th and 15th**. We will discuss the concerns about sanctuary and immigration as well as concerns for the legislative session that is about to begin. As followers of Jesus, we are called to work towards and be sign posts for the Reign of God that he announced. (And we'll be hearing about that in worship on Sundays in January!)

We are also working towards a public event on **Saturday, January 28, 2017**: For Such a Time as This — Building Our Prophetic Resistance. The meeting will be held from **1:00pm to 4:00pm** at **Shiloh Temple International Ministries (1201 W. Broadway in Minneapolis)**. We hope to have over 1500 Minnesotans to gather with leaders like Governor Dayton and our Senators, Amy Klobuchar and Al Franken. Together we will lament the failures of our time and articulate a vision of how our communities can flourish as we move in the direction God is calling us toward ... a community in which every member is valued as a beloved child of God, where everyone is included and no one is left out, where we share out of abundance so that all may flourish rather than clinging to whatever we can grab in our fear of scarcity.

THE ST. OLAF CHOIR IS BACK AT REDEEMER AFTER 91 YEARS!


Yes, it is true. On April 29, 1926, Redeemer hosted the St. Olaf Choir's performance at the old Auditorium in downtown St. Paul. Redeemer's choir and Pastor Paul Lindemann were responsible for all of the choir's local arrangements. This included advertising, ticket sales, and providing supper for the choir in what we now call Redeemer's Undercroft.

Now, 91 years later, Redeemer will again host the St. Olaf Choir on Saturday, January 21st. This time the choir will actually perform at Redeemer in our renovated sanctuary! We are the choir's first stop on their 3-week tour and their only performance in the Twin Cities. And our own Amy Erlandson is a member of the choir!

While we are not responsible for advertising and ticket sales, we will provide supper for the choir, a post-concert reception, and ushers. In the days leading up to the concert, we will be asking for volunteers to help with a variety of tasks – dusting the sanctuary floor and pews, vacuuming the carpet in the sanctuary and in the stairwells, and just general decluttering and "spiffying up" in the Undercroft and adjacent rooms. We will also need volunteers to assist with serving the supper and the reception. Most importantly, we want to be gracious and welcoming hosts for both the choir and the approximately 400 people who will attend the concert.

Hosting the St. Olaf Choir is an honor and an incredible opportunity for our congregation. It does, however, come with some cost to us and we will need financial contributions to make this event happen. We must make the long-delayed repairs to the plumbing in the sacristy bathroom (about \$2,500). Anton Armstrong, the choir's conductor, will use the sacristy as his "green room." We also need to purchase food and beverages for the supper and the after-concert reception and have the sanctuary piano tuned.

You will be hearing more specifics about volunteer and financial needs in the coming days and weeks via email. Tickets for the concert are \$30 for adults and \$10 for students. They are available online at stolaf.edu/tickets. They will not be sold at the door. If you need assistance with purchasing tickets online, Redeemer's office will be happy to help you.




