A Letter From Pastor Erlandson

Jesus said to the twelve: "Whoever welcomes you welcomes me, and whoever welcomes me welcomes the one who sent me. Whoever welcome a prophet in the name of a prophet will receive a prophet's reward:

and whoever welcomes a righteous person in the name of a righteous person will receive the reward of the righteous;

and whoever gives even a cup of cold water to one of these little ones in the name of a disciple -

truly I tell you, none of these will lose their reward." (Matthew 10:40-42)

Dear Friends in Christ,

In this lesson read on the first Sunday in July, we hear the mission of hospitality given a deeper meaning by Jesus. We have all been taught to offer hospitality in our homes, a value passed on from generation to generation. In these present days of home security systems, gated and segregated communities, sometimes the value of hospitality and welcome may seem to becoming lost. The days of a neighbor, relative or friend "just stopping by" for a cup of coffee or conversation on the front porch seem almost gone. Replaced by creating networks of "Facebook Friends" or Twitter followers whom we never see face to face.

When Jesus sent out his disciples to go out into the towns and villages to share the good news of God's love, heal diseases and cast out demons, he didn't leave out the role of welcome for those who received them (or didn't). He said "whoever welcomes you welcomes me and the one who sent me" - meaning Jesus, and God the Creator. He didn't mean just those ancient peoples in ancient towns, welcoming Jesus' twelve disciples. Jesus also means us, today - and how we welcome those who come to us, in Jesus' name.

The scriptures in the Old Testament also call for God's people to "welcome the stranger". We do a lot these days to extend a welcome to visitors and guests - and to the community . Many church signs say *ALL ARE WELCOME*. In our own statement of welcome, which appears in every Sunday service sheet, we say:

Each and every person is a child of God. [We] strive to be genuinely welcoming to all people....We welcome you without regard to culture, ethnicity, skin color, physical or mental ability, age, family situation, refugee or immigrant status, economic or social standing. As a Reconciling in Christ congregation we welcome you without regard to sexual orientation or gender identity.

So let's always remember that when we welcome any child of God among us, we do so as if we are welcoming Jesus himself. It's a matter of faith.

ADVENTURES IN SUMMER EVENING WORSHIP JULY 23RD & 30TH ~ AUGUST 6TH & 13TH

On these four dates, we will hold the **primary Sunday worship at 7:00pm in the Courtyard Garden** (*weather permitting, of course*). We will be using a service of **Evening Prayer with Communion** called *Unfailing Light*, written by Susan Briehl and Marty Haugen. The service will be a little different and we will also be exploring some different ways of engaging with the scriptures during the service. **Bring Your Lawn Chairs** -- We are encour-

aging people to bring their own lawn chairs for Evening Worship in the Courtyard later this month. However, as we hope to have people come who may not have received that message, loans of extra lawn chairs would be appreciated. You can bring extra lawn chairs to the church on any Sunday. Please have your name clearly written on the chairs some where. The chairs will be on hand on Sunday evenings for those who didn't bring their own (or forgot -- it happens). Chairs will be returned to their proper owners after the August 13th service. We will be practicing the music for the service in the coming weeks.

Sunday Morning Worship WILL Continue during these weeks! The regular Sunday order for worship will be followed at the morning services and Holy Communion will be offered. However, there may be less music during these services (less singing, fewer hymns). While it is hoped that many in the congregation will opt to participate in the evening service to help support visitors, guests, and the curious passers-by who may come, the evening time and the courtyard environment do present obstacles to a number of our members. The goal is that no one be deprived of weekly worship opportunities.

YouthWorks Summer at Redeemer

Redeemer has been a busy, lively place this summer since YouthWorks moved in, at the beginning of June. The Undercroft and Learning Center have become a youth ministry "urban immersion camp" occupied 24/7 by Youthworks staff. From Sunday evening through Friday morning, middleschool and high-scholl aged youth from churcheshe Upper Midwest have slept on our floors in sleeping bags and air mattressses. During the days they have been our "mission ambassadors", doing work projects feeding people at Dorothy Day and other spots along University Avenue, leading Kids Club at Bethlehem Lutheran on the Midway, learning hip-hop ministry, and touring the Minnesota History Center and other locations. They have gotten to know people who are homeless and people



who live and work in this community, opening their eyes to many things. A highlight of each week is the meal we share with them at Redeemer on Thursday evenings at 5:30 pm. After dinner we often lead various crafts, have a fire going in the courtyard garden for roasting marshmallow and making s'mores, sing camp songs and hear stories from the youth about their experiences that week.

YouthWorks this summer has been a great shot in the arm for our ministry at Redeemer, and a good partnership. We offer our facilities, and the youth do the work of ministry in our community! On the Fourth of July the Youth (supervised by Sam and Diana Rankin) did some landscaping on Redeemer's front lawn and



courtyard garden! A big thank you to the YouthWorks staff: Betsy Reiff, Alexis Beed, Matt Hoffman, and Brenda Whitten. They do a great job preparing and leading all the youth activities. Any Redeemer member or friend is welcome on Thursday evenings for dinner at 5:30 pm, through the month of July, and ending Thursday, August 3rd. Come meet some great kids and adults, and enjoy the fun!
